


Introduction














"Reach out to other local businesses that have mutual views and community values and help each other by sharing social media posts or hosting joint events."


"More accessible places and activities for people who are lonely and for places to network with each other more for the community, rather than try and outdo each other to be the best."


The Live Project group travelled to Bentley High Street to talk to passers-by regarding what they know about Bentley Urban Farm. The questions asked were the same as those in the survey.

Bentley Urban Farm




The commune runs the farm alongside volunteers who contribute their time and knowledge to ensure the farm runs smoothly and continues to be an asset to the local community.

What does ACiTN do already?

- Alternative provision classes for an hour every Tuesday
- · Community meals hosted at the farm
- Festivals for people to visit
- Hosts workshops and teachings
- Volunteer work

The Farmhouse



The Farmhouse is the larger of the two properties owned by ACiTN, where four of the seven members currently live.

What does ACiTN do already?

- Cook for each other and also guests to the house/farm
- Includes a timber workshop, from which a carpenter operates
- Working on renovating the house

The Old Vicarage




The house that owns the field adjacent to the farm

54 Cooke Street




54 Cooke Street is the second house owned by ACiTN, where the other three members live.

New Village School




New Village School is a local primary school in Bentley.

St Peter's Church hosts a variety of community events and is a social hub for the surrounding area.


What does ACiTN do already?

- Wednesday coffee mornings are run by the church every week for the local community in Bentley. In the past, Bentley Urban Farm has contributed by composting the used coffee cups.
- Providing produce for Harvest Festival
- Community meals
- A joint ceilidh as a fundraiser for the farm

Further Opportunities

- The farm can begin to reintroduce the coffee cup service to further improve their relationship with the church and community
- Church use of the fire pit for worship
- Bentley Urban Farm can attend to engagement with the church, potentially a stall to each week by composting the used coffee cups





Ransome Practice




What could ACiTN do?



- BUF can put posters in the foyer to encourage people to visit the farm and eat healthily.


Bentley Primary Care Centre (2026)





The organisation creates bold, research-driven art that sparks dialogue about the future and social change. Working collaboratively with communities, they make imaginative


collaboratively with communities, they make imaginative, playful, and politically engaged projects that foster solidarity and support an environmentally just world.






Granby Four Streets (CLT)








Who are they?

Granby Four Streets Community Land Trust (CLT) is a community led initiative that strives to provide housing at a continuously affordable price, using 13 houses transferred to them by Liverpool City Council. The trust owns the land the houses sit on, and when the value of the land increases, this money is invested into their communal benefit.

"Creating a thriving, vibrant mixed community, building on the existing creativity, energy and commitment within the community, where people from all walks of life can live, work and play."

Granby is a neighbourhood in Liverpool that previous to the CLT's intervention had run into disrepair during a period of failed regeneration initiatives. Their manifesto is to breathe new life into Granby and its High Street to celebrate the character and energy that the area once had.

How do they engage with the local community?





Granby Market

They have a monthly stall at Granby Street to engage with the local community, setting the stage for their future businesses.

Shopfronts

Granby Four Streets' plan is to renovate the empty shops at the junction of Cairns Street and Granby Street. This is to help the community to revive life at Granby Street.

Greening Granby

Starting with their Winter Garden, Granby Four Streets want to continue planting in public and social spaces.

How do they get funding?

Granby Four Streets CLT have formed many relationships over time with groups who financially support their vision.














The Boards:

The three groups below are those who qualify to be part of the Granby Four Streets CLT's board. The board must have equal representation from each of these groups. The responsibility of the board is to run the organisation and their activities.

The board holds a yearly general meeting within six months of the end of the financial year. At these general meetings, the board changes hands to a completely new set of board members who have been appointed within the rules.



Key Findings

- Granby Four Street has renovated 13 previously unused houses.
- They have started by attending the Granby Market with a stall with hopes to raise funding to bring life back into the shopfronts in the area.
- Their board structure mandates an equal number of members who live in the area as members in the CLT, to ensure all voices are heard.

Squash Liverpool







Who are they?

Founded by artists in 2010, Squash is a community organisation operating in Windsor Street, Liverpool.

"Ours is a 100-year vision, manifesting through arts and culture and rooted in nature; we're transforming our Windsor Street neighbourhood into a people-powered place, known around the world for being a playful, innovative, resilient & loving community where everybody thrives."

Squash is a CIC - Community Interest Company. A CIC is a limited company that seeks to benefit the local community rather than private stakeholders. Squash's ethos is rooted in improving health and wellbeing by implementing their 'essential tools': art, creativity, and food.

- Squash centres all of their community activities around art, food and nature.
- The CIC rent out their spaces when they are not using them to maximise what they have to offer.
- They offer targeted donations so people donating can feel proud of where their money is going.

Kitty's Launderette







Who are they?

Kitty's Launderette is a community clothes washing hub in Liverpool for locals to come together, do creative tasks, and socialise. Their heritage is in the historical prominence of wash houses in Liverpool, primarily pioneered by Kitty Wilkinson, the launderette's namesake.

"Our launderette builds on a rich social history in our city and the important role of launderettes and washhouses in our communities."

To ensure the success of their community launderette, the team spent three years researching and engaging with the local community. They also spent time building their business plan and finding funds for the scheme. Since May 2019, the launderette has been open consistently for six days a week.

Key Findings

- · Laundry is a necessity based on the basic human need for clothing.
- The scheme had the foundation of three years of research and community engagement to hone in on what the area really needed.
- Kitty's Launderette has a rooted history in the area due to its connection to wash houses and Kitty Wilkinson.
